Candidates for Election to the Board of Directors

Vince Bonafede - I have been a company member since 1973. I have served as musical director for over 20 shows, the most recent being this season's *The Melody Lingers On*. The Board of Directors should be comprised of people representing all areas relating to SLOC production and administrative functions. As a musician I feel that I can lend my musical experience and expertise to keep other Board members informed on how decisions

made by the board effect the musicians and other musical aspects of the company.

Jackie Mosher - My first introduction to SLOC was in the 1970's as an enthusiastic audience member. Shortly thereafter I became Assistant to the Director for Proctor's Theatre where I had the pleasure of working with many talented people from SLOC when they used the theater for several of their performances. As producer of all of Proctor's Christmas Shows my goal (in addition to putting on the best show possible!) was to provide a showcase to local performers of all ages. Again, in that capacity, I worked with many members of SLOC. I finally became an "official member" when I co-produced the 70th Anniversary Show, Me and My Girl and Sweeney Todd. I am now enjoying serving on the Spotlight editorial staff and working at Schenectady VanCurler Music Store. If I am elected to the board, I hope to use my experience at Proctor's and my knowledge of our local music and art community to help maintain the already high performance standards and to attract newcomers to the group so that SLOC's 75 years of success goes on "ad infinitum".

Brett Putnam - Since joining SLOC in January of 1996, I have been captivated by the magic of this place. This is a place for amateur theatre lovers to come, have fun, learn, develop lasting friendships, and excel in their art. This is a place that routinely produces exceptional theatrical presentations. Over the past six years, I have been involved with nearly all of our productions, in which I have served in many technical departments and occasional on-stage cameos. I have produced two shows in the past two seasons and have served for four years as Vice-President of Technical Operations, where I have worked to develop a technical internship program, to improve our costume shop and to clean, inventory, and organize the Taurus Road scene shop. I have worked hard at organizing the technical equipment and supplies and purchasing important equipment necessary for both enhanced technical capabilities and improved safety. I have spearheaded the purchase and installation of a state-of-the-art audio system for SLOC. I have been very involved in the 75th Anniversary events this year, and I have taken a keen interest in the long-term financial stability and continuation of SLOC as a major cultural center in Schenectady. I would very much like to continue to serve on the Board of the Directors, and I pledge to focus my volunteer theatre efforts exclusively in the service of SLOC.

Michelle Sausa-Gatta has been associated with SLOC since 1980. She and her son, Richard have been active in almost every show in the past two years. Michelle has performed on stage in many productions and has more recently worked back stage doing stage managing, Co-producing, set painting, bartending, ushering and organizing cast get-togethers. Several years ago Michelle worked on the SLOC kitchen remodeling and would like to see more projects that would continue to spruce up the facility to make it more appealing to our patrons. Away from the opera house, Michelle Sausa-Gatta is an elementary vocal music teacher for Niskayuna Schools and enjoys directing the Hillside School Chorus and the student musicals. Michelle was pleased and proud to be able to perform in the recent SLOC production of Camelot with several of her own music students.

Ted Vickery - I have been a member of the company for over 10 years. During that time, I have served as the VP of Technical Operations, and as past and present VP of Facilities. This year, I have started repairs to the green room wall water damage, fixed the broken urinal in the men's room (I know all the guys are thanking me for that!) and have started to systematically replace the toilets in both men's and ladie's room. I have also produced several productions, and organized Taurus Road and Opera House Cleanup days. Being well versed in the facility operations and other technical area of SLOC, I feel that my input into those decisions will be a valuable asset to the composition of the Board.

Deb Wieskopf - I have been involved with SLOC for six years now. Shortly after my first show here, I knew that this was a place I wanted to spend more time. Over the past six years I have made many new friends and acquaintances. It wasn't until this past year however, that I learned so much about SLOC's history and background. This season, I was given the opportunity to co-chair the 75th anniversary committee. I was a little overwhelmed at first, after all, what could I, a fairly new member to the SLOC family, have to offer? I soon learned that everyone that is part of this organization has something to offer. Throughout the year our committee


