### Note from the Directors:

This production is scheduled to be the first show at our new theater in Schenectady. So, you have the opportunity to participate in this historic event. If you've never been in a Gilbert and Sullivan chorus, you are in for a treat. The show in general is silly and fun with extraordinary music. No dancing is required, but there will be a lot of staged movement. We will likely do English accents but the main focus is on the quality of the singing, and "Diction." More importantly we are looking for performers with strong singing voices, great diction, energy and animation on stage.

### Some **THE PIRATES OF PENZANCE** Factsoids...

- 1) *The Pirates of Penzance* concerns Frederic, who having completed his 21st year, is released from his apprenticeship to a band of tenderhearted pirates. He meets Mabel and the two fall in love. Frederic finds out, however, that he was born on Feb 29, and so, technically, he only has a birthday each leap year. His apprenticeship indentures state that he remains apprenticed to the pirates until his 21st birthday, and so he must serve for another 63 years. Mabel agrees to wait for him faithfully.
- 2) This comic opera's official premier was at the 5th Ave. Theatre in NYC on Dec. 31, 1879.
- 3) On Dec 21, 1879 Sullivan's letter to his mother about PIRATES stated: "I think it will be a great success, for it is exquisitely funny and the music is strikingly tuneful and catching."
- 4) In 1981, Joseph Papp brought a new production of PIRATES to Broadway (Choreographed by Graciella Daniele; 787 performances) starring Linda Rondstadt, Rex Smith and Kevin Kline. Some notable Broadway and National Tour replacements were Pam Dawber, Maureen McGovern, Treat Williams, Barry Bostwick, Andy Gibb and Jo Anne Worley.
- 5) PIRATES was the 5th Gilbert & Sullivan collaboration.
- 6) PIRATES remains popular today, taking its place along with The Mikado and HMS Pinafore as one of the most frequently played Gilbert & Sullivan operas.
- 7) PIRATES was the only Gilbert & Sullivan opera to have its official premier in the USA.

<b>Role Name</b>	<b>Role Type</b>	<b>Voice Part</b>	<b>Description</b>
Frederick	Lead	Tenor	Frederick is 21 years old, manly, genuine and innocent. He has great verve and energy, is out-going, unaffected and honest. The role requires an excellent upper vocal range.
Mabel	Lead	Soprano	Mabel is 17 – 21 years old and very much a young woman of the 19 <sup>th</sup> century. She is energetic, expressive, innocent and unassuming. The role requires an excellent upper range and the ability to perform the coloratura sections on several musical numbers.
Pirate King	Lead	Baritone	Age range can vary (30ish to 50) The Pirate King is very kingly and manly with a large ego. Role requires a big baritone voice
Major General Stanley	Lead	Baritone	Age (40 to 60), Role requires a comedic touch and the ability to sing the quickly paced patter song. Not terribly demanding vocally
Ruth	Lead	Alto	Age (40 – 60). A doting English Nanny type of character. Vocal selections require a strong low range for an alto.
Major General's Daughters	Supporting	Soprano	Three daughters, Edit, Kate and Isabel. Ages (late teens to twenties). The three daughters always appear together and often sing as a trio with solo's included. We may choose to augment them with 2 or 3 additional wards, A fun chorus part.
Pirate Chorus	Chorus	Tenor/Baritone	Age (very flexible). Typical Pirates. A lot of good chorus numbers. Need some high tenor voices for some of the chorus. We would like to cast about 10 pirates. A fun chorus part.
Police Chorus	Chorus	Baritone Base	Age (flexible). Stodgy, ineffectual policeman. Low voices needed (especially for the Sergeant.). A fun chorus part.

## **ATTENTION SLOC MEMBERS (BYLAWS to be discussed & voted upon at ANNUAL MEETING)**

On June 12, 2010 proposed amendments to the Bylaws will be presented for a vote by the membership. Members that are qualified to vote will have received an official notification by mail with a copy of the proposed changes prior to the receipt of this newsletter.

The current Bylaws were revised in 1995 and saw a minor change in 2001. The Board is recommending the changes to strengthen our membership and to support the coming changes as we move to our new home.

Consistent with the most recent Strategic Plan for SLOCs development, the Board recommends the following changes to the Bylaws that will:

- clarify and expand the participation requirements for voting membership
- establish a non-voting category of membership for donors
- establish a single position of Vice President of the Board of Directors
- establish a committee structure and delineate the responsibilities of the committee Chairs and transition the all other Vice President titles to committee Chairs
- establish that voting Board Officers including the President and the Vice President are selected by the Board members from among the Board members elected by the voting members of the company;
- expand the maximum number of consecutive years a Board member can serve from four (4) years to Five (5) years
- permit the appointment of non-voting ex officio Treasurer and Secretary in the absence of an available appointee among the elected Board members

My skills in communications, problem solving, and balancing multiple priorities from competing sources combined with my background as a singer and performer have been good preparation for this one year term on the Board. They have served me well in facing and evaluating the problems and opportunities that came to the Board this year.

I would very much like the opportunity to continue to serve on the Board of Directors for a full two year term as SLOC grows into our new venue with its expanded opportunities and responsibilities.

# GET INVOLVED!!!

SLOC is a company of volunteers. Everything we do is done by volunteers, from acting, producing and directing, designing and building sets; designing, hanging and running lighting; designing and sewing costumes and managing our costume collection; stage crew and stage management; ushering and concession sales; selling tickets; painting and decorating our new building complex; folding letters and stuffing envelopes; making phone calls to members, volunteers, donors, advertisers; writing/editing our newsletter; coordinating publicity and all kinds of administrative support to better serve our members and volunteers and to support this not for profit business that is SLOC Musical Theater.

All of this work is done by long-term and loyal volunteers and we're always looking for more.

We especially need new volunteers to become involved again with this organization. Can't do what you used to be able to do? Don't think in terms of what you can't do, think about what you can do.

Like to talk to people on the phone? We need people to make phone calls to members and potential volunteers. This will not require a substantial time commitment, but might just put you in touch with folks you haven't seen or talked to for quite a while.

Have a friend who isn't a member but who has some time or is looking for something to do? Bring them along. We can find work for willing hands from painting the new building complex to stuffing envelopes for a mass mailing.

Can't make the time commitment to work on a show? That doesn't mean you can't stay involved.

This past year we have had an acute and chronic shortage of volunteers to run concessions. We need only one person to be responsible for concessions each performance. This person is assisted by 2 to 3 people at the intermission, typically people who are ushering. The concession manager for the performance sets up the concession area before the intermission; cleans up the concession area after the intermission; and counts the money received. The time commitment can be as little as an hour or less! It's a great way to stay involved with SLOC and meet new members.

We also continue to need ushers. Each performance requires 8 ushers and the ushers should be available one hour prior to the performance and approximately 30 minutes after curtain. Ushers are seated in the audience if there are seats available for that performance.

As we prepare to move into the new building complex we have been having regular work Saturdays at the former Bethesda House, now the Education Building. It will be a wonderful new home for SLOC but in addition to the major construction work that is required, there is painting and cleaning and organizing needed to get the spaces ready for occupancy by us or by our new tenants.

The Capital Lyceum is a new private high school that is planning to be SLOC's major tenant in our Education Building. Ms Hawn caused quite a stir for each of these organizations. A luncheon at the Glen Sanders Mansion was attended by almost 300 people and the dinner at 677 Prime by about 70 people. Ms. Hawn was charming and promoting her "Mind Up" program that helps students to be less stressed, more confident and therefore in a better mind set for learning. Her goal is to reduce the high school drop out rate in our country. She squeezed in a tour of Schenectady, including SLOC's Performing Arts Center. She was delighted with the renovated space in the former Bethesda House and thoroughly impressed with the architectural design of our new theater. Ms. Hawn entered through our stage door and liked the space so much that she broke into song, singing "Another Openin, Another Show" from *Kiss Me, Kate*. She wishes us well and her presence in the Capital District provided wonderful free publicity for SLOC.

# **SLOC CAMPAIGN & FUNDRAISING UPDATES**

If all goes according to plan, as you read this we will have completed the purchase of the St. John the Baptist property. It's been a long road, and we couldn't have gotten there without each and everyone of you.

In order to assist with the closing and to assist with renovations over the next 3 years, we have partnered with First National Bank of Scotia to establish a multi-year line of credit. Special thanks to all our SLOC donors, the City and County, Ray Gillen and the Schenectady Metroplex Development Authority, and the Golub Foundation. Also a special note of thanks to Maura Mottolese, of Higgins, Roberts, Beyerl and Coan, who worked so tirelessly to make this day a reality.

The purchase of St. John the Baptist will ensure that we open our 2010-2011 season at our new location, and means we will also step up efforts to sell our existing theater.

We have raised more than \$600,000 in funds received and commitments towards Phase One of the Capital Campaign. This funding includes a \$300,000 Metroplex grant, \$20,000 County Grant, \$50,000 Golub grant, \$50,000 from SLOC investments, more than \$30,000 in donated materials and services, and more than \$160,000 in private donations.

With the closing of the property, additional campaign phases include corporate solicitation, show underwriting and sponsorship, and pursuit of other local foundations, as well as regional and national foundations.

## **You've Got Mail**

Well maybe too much mail. If you got more than one copy of our recent Capital Campaign solicitation, please know that the issue is being addressed for future communications. We are in the process of melding three major sources of information, and have formed a new database committee being lead by Gina and Bill Kornrumpf to oversee this process. Special thanks to Peter Codella for almost two decades of dedicated service creating the foundation for our new database, and to Ross Snyder for his more recent work.

## **Lease Revenue**

Bob Farquharson, Joseph Fava and John Samatulski are taking the lead on identifying new nonprofit partnerships that may or may not include providing low cost leased space for other nonprofit arts and education organizations. The leases will provide an important source of revenue to offset the increased operating costs of the new facility.

Schoharie River Center ([schoharierivercenter.org](http://schoharierivercenter.org)) has already moved into the second floor of the Theater Annex (former rectory) and we are in the process of finalizing the lease with Capital Lyceum for the third floor of the education Building (former Bethesda House). In partnership with Capital Lyceum, and with donated materials and services secured by Urban Initiatives Group and Joseph Fava, we recently completed more than \$30,000 in improvements to the third floor space.
