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Once again, the Schenectady Light Opera Company welcomes you to an evening of fine musical entertainment; all of our members join me in hoping that you will have a thoroughly enjoyable evening.

During the past two years, we have been most pleased to see a continuing growth in the size and enthusiasm of our audiences. This trend is very gratifying and will serve to encourage us in our continuing efforts to provide Schenectady with polished performances of the best from the musical stage.

However, this trend has also created a vastly increased demand for tickets which makes itself felt so early that all choice seats for certain performances are sold weeks in advance of opening night; we realize that this has meant that many of you have been disappointed in your seat locations.

We are, therefore, inaugurating a new policy by which definite seat reservations for the coming season can be made at the close of the current season. You will find in your program a card containing on one side a ticket order form which may be used to order tickets for the 1954 Fall show, or the 1954-1955 Season, and on the other side a Special Membership Order Form which may be used by those of you who wish to provide additional support by becoming Special Members of the Schenectady Light Opera Company.

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Of course, as in the past, you may return the card without remittance and your name will be added to our mailing list, with no seats being reserved.

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The story takes place in the French colonies in America at the time of the French revolution. Robert Misson, a French nobleman with Republican leanings, takes refuge from King Louis and his crack detective, Ribaud, by indenturing himself as a bondservant. He serves in the home of aristocratic M. Beaunoir. This gentleman has a lovely daughter, Marianne, and in the manner of operetta, Robert soon falls in love with her.

Marianne, being somewhat haughty, doesn't return his affection and inadvertantly gives him away to Ribaud. Robert is captured and is taken aboard "The New Moon" for shipment back to France. The ship also, carried a load of brides bound for the French colonies in the West Indies.

With the sailing of "The New Moon" the action really comes into full swing. The ship is overtaken by "pirates" who turn out to be revolutionary friends of Robert. With an ideal Republican colony as their goal, and with a ship-full of brides to help them implement it, the revolutionaries, with Robert, as their leader, and Ribaud as their prisoner, sail to an uninhabitated island. Here they set up their colony.

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be married anyway. However, by a strange quirk of fate (though not of operetta), Marianne is also aboard "The New Moon". Robert agrees to marry her, as a formality, but the marriage remains platonic for over a year.

How Marianne is reconciled to Robert, how Ribaud is foiled in his effort to deliver the colony to a French naval force, and how freedom and republicanism triumph constitute the remainder of the operetta.

SOME LITTLE KNOWN FACTS ABOUT "NEW MOON"

"New Moon" is considered to be one of the most successful operettas ever presented on the American stage. It is interesting to note that this musical is a factual story—and the version you see this evening is not the original. "New Moon" is an authentic plot—it is founded on actual events as carefully recounted in "The Autobiography of Robert Mission".

In 1928 "New Moon" first opened in Philadelphia in the face of "star trouble". The prima donna found her voice could not stand the strain of the music, and a most unsteady understudy went on on opening night. In addition, the male star faced a serious operation the following day.

Following the Philadelphia run, the producers, unhappy with the show,

Following the Fuladelphia run, the producers, unnappy with the snow, burned the scenery, sold the costumes, and tore up the existing scripts. It was then they realized that the show was to open in New York three weeks later. A deserted hotel at Montauk Point was secured, the show rewritten, and within three weeks the present version of "New Moon" played to New York audiences. Subsequently 509 performances were played. For the next two years, four companies toured the United States, and later the operetta broke records in Paris.

Since then, large and small Light Opera groups all over America have presented this delightful musical to enthusiastic audiences.
