
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

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


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About the Show

The Burns Mantle Yearbook of The Best Plays of 1961-1962 includes How to Succeed in Business without Really Trying as the biggest hit of the season. This "non-romantic" musical which played over 1400 performances on Broadway and launched the career of Robert Morse and revived the popularity of Rudy Vallee.

For 1961-1962 The New York Drama Critics voted *How to Succeed* as the Best Musical Production of the season. The Pulitzer Prize was awarded to this musical, the fourth musical to be so honored in the 45 year history of this award. Numerous Tony Awards were also won by the members of the cast and the production staff.

LONNIE D. Clar, Finch, is starring in his first role for SLOC moving up from the chorus in South Pacific. Lonnie, who studied at the Eastman School of Music, has sung with many musical groups and glee clubs as soloist, lead, and chorus member. An avid amateur photographer he accepted the additional assignment as program photographer. Now an attorney in Albany, he graduated from the University of Rochester and Cornell Law School, Ithaca.

George Kahlbaugh, Biggley, appears in his first role for SLOC. Previous theatrical experience includes roles at the Civic Playhouse, the Cooperstown Playhouse Summer Stock Company and the Albany Episcopal Actors Guild. An Episcopal Priest in the Diocese of Albany he is Diocesan Director of Christian Education and Director of Beaver Cross, the Episcopal Summer Camp near Cooperstown. George holds degrees from Franklin and Marshall College and the Philadelphia Divinity School.

Sandra Hallfors, *Hedy*, has appeared in feature roles, the dance ensemble and as a specialty dancer for several SLOC shows. She has also been in Playhouse productions. Sandy sings with the "Melodears," a Women's Barbershop Chorus. Her husband, Lauri, is playing in the orchestra.

Honey Berry Templeton, Rosemary, is singing her fifth leading role for SLOC. She has studied with the American Theater Wing in New York City and appeared with the Albany Light Opera Company, and the Saratoga Spa Summer Theater. Formerly soloist at the Third Reformed Church, Albany, Rosemary is currently associated as an artist member of the Albany Monday Musical Club.

John S. Liccard, Frump, is making his first appearance with the Company. Enrolled at Albany Law School, he graduated from Middleburg College where he appeared in several theater productions and Opera workshops. John comes to the Capital District from New Jersey and enjoys outdoor activities in between studies and rehearsals.

Connie Manning Holzer, Smitty, playing her second major role for SLOC, is also the Set Designer for this production. She has assisted in painting scenery and has been a member of the chorus in several previous shows. Connie studied at Emerson College, at the Boston Museum School and in New York City. Her musical experience includes performances with Les Elgart's Orchestra, The Today Show, The Tonight Show, The Earl Pudney Show, The Pleiku Hospital Fund Show and the 1967 United Fund Show. Currently she is artist-illustrator for "New York State Education."

HAROLD E. HOLZER, Bratt, joins his wife on stage in his SLOC debut. For the past three years he has served on technical crews and stage manager. This season he is Special Membership Chairman. Hal is with the Machinery Apparatus Operation at G.E. as a Senior Contract Negotiator. He graduated from MIT.

CARMEN SGARLATA, Wally Womper, well known to area theater goers, has appeared in and directed many SLOC and Playhouse productions. He was a cofounder of "Musicals Under the Stars." A past president of the company, he is currently on the Board of Directors. Carmen is associated with the Hartford Insurance Company.

JANE COFFEY, Miss Jones, is the ranking member of the cast and crew having been with the company for more than twenty years. One of the originators of the Pashley Players, she has remained an active participant. On the music staff at Glenhaven School, Jane can be seen weekly on Channel 17's "Let's Make Music" program. A graduate of the College of Wooster in Ohio, she is affiliated with several musical organizations on the State and Local level.

Toby Tyler, Gatch, is portraying his second SLOC role. An Amherst College graduate, Toby recently joined the Management Training Program at G.E. He appeared in school and college productions and is also with the Merrimoppets.

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Who's Who in Production

Gioia Ottaviano (Producer) a consistent and valued contributor to SLOC for many seasons, has also produced Can Can and Guys and Dolls. She has served the company as secretary, a member of the Board of Directors, and painting coordinator for several shows. Gioia is a graduate of the State Colleges at Buffalo and Potsdam and the State University at Albany. A former classroom teacher, she is now assigned as librarian at Woodlawn School, Schenectady.

ORLANDO PIGLIAVENTO (Director/Choreographer) has employed his artistic talents for SLOC during the past several years as director of Most Happy Fella, choreographer for numerous productions and as a featured specialty dancer. He has also served on the Board of Directors. Orlando choreographed The Boy Friend for the Schenectady Civic Playhouse and produced the 1967 United Fund Campaign Show. With his wife, Eleanor, he is the owner of the Orlando School of Dance. A graduate of Siena College and the State College at Oneonta, he is a member of the faculty of Glenhaven School, Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake District.

AIBERT E. Moser (Musical Director) returns to SLOC after an absence of several years. He previously conducted Kurt Weil's *Down in the Valley*. Prior to his present position as Chairman of the Guidance Department at Scotia Glenville High School he was a member of the school music staff. Al graduated from Lebanon Valley College, Pennsylvania, and the State University at Albany. Ordained into the Episcopal Ministry he serves as Perpetual Deacon at St. Andrews Church, Scotia.

Don MacMillan (Chorus Master) has been associated with SLOC for many years as a performer and accompanist. He is the Conductor of the Schenectady Choral Society and Organist and Choir Director at the Eastern Parkway Methodist Church. Don recently received a Ph. D degree in Mathematics from RPI and is an associate in the American Guild of Organists. He is employed at KAPL.

Varro Clarke (Stage Manager) participating in this key position for the fifth time, has worked backstage in eleven SLOC shows. For Kiss Me Kate he had the dual assignment as stage manager and the similar role on-stage. Varro recently joined the New York State Thruway Authority as an Administrative Analyst. He is a graduate of the University of Nebraska.

JACK D. BYRNE (Set Designer) has contributed his varied talents to SLOC as producer, director, stage-manager, crew technician, Board member and Vice President. At the Playhouse he has served a term as President and directed and appeared in several productions. A graduate of Manhattan College, he is a sales engineer with General Electric Industrial Sales Division.

ANN BALDASARE (Costume Mistress) is filling this post for SLOC for the first time. She has worked on make-up for SLOC and the Civic Playhouse.

GLADYS LUTHY (Make-up Chairman) active with both SLOC and the Playhouse has chaired make-up for many productions. She has also appeared on stage for both groups. Gladys and her sister Ann, Costume Mistress, hail from London, England where they were members of the Polytechnic Repertory and Acorn Players. Both now participate in Community Scouting activities.

Ted Rautenberg (Sound Technician) marks this show as his sixteenth SLOC production staff assignment. He and his crew continually work to maintain, modify and advance the company sound system in order to augment each production. Ted is a member of the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra and the Board of Directors of Community Concerts. A graduate of Amherst College he is a physicist at the General Electric Research Laboratory.

BEN FRIED, (Lighting Designer) assumes his first SLOC assignment with this show. A relative newcomer to the area he has worked this season on lighting design at the Playhouse. Ben has also done Technical work for the Cornell Dramatic Club, The Savoyards, Saranac Lake Playhouse and Yorktown Heights Playhouse. A graduate of Cornell University, he is now a Claims Representative for State Farm Mutual.

Beverly Chapman (Properties Chairman) is serving in this capacity for the third time. She has previously served as program chairman and Cue Mistress. She is a graduate of New England Deaconess Hospital.

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
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
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
