Dressed as a clown, Christ seems more human, reachable, vulnerable. Through him we can make tangible our doubts, our ironic hope. Only by assuming a playful attitude toward our religious tradition, can we possibly make any sense of it. Only by learning to laugh at the hopelessness around us can we touch the hem of hope. Christ the clown signifies our playful appreciation of the past and our comic refusal to accept inevitability in the future.

The thing that takes <code>Godspell</code> out of the typical Jesus-freak category is the very simplicity and childlike exuberance with which it brings the message of St. Mathew's Gospel to today's society without the distortions of wayout interpretations. It is pure in heart and therefore comes across the footlights with the pure joy and exhilaration of a fresh story, freshly told in songs, dances and comedic highlights. The overpowering grief of the Crucifixion is made doubly devastating because of the happiness and laughter which have preceded it.

In Godspell the message is joy and hope. The cast sings "Long Live God" and tells about the day when "man's clouded sun shall brightly rise and songs be heard instead of sighs."

It is to John-Michael Tebelak that one looks for the inventive freshness and high spirits of *Godspell*. He comments on his conceptualization of *Godspell*:

"The clown has to save the cause. He takes on himself the sins and problems of others." He continued, "A clown is the highest form of the artist—the highest form of man. He not only laughs at himself but he makes other people laugh at him. And to be able to do that is to have tolerance and love and jubilation, which is what Christ is about—tolerance, love and jubilation. Godspell is more theatre than religion, but theatre started in religion. Churchgoing today, I feel, is too formal, too restricted, too organized. I hope Godspell is a joyful, total theatre experience."

WHO'S WHO in the CAST

Helena Binder

Helena returned from New York, where she was attending Circle in the Square Theatre School and Workshop, to do Godspell. She appeared in SLOC productions of Gypsy as Electra and Miss Cratchitt, in George M. as Josie Cohan, and did the "Nothing" song from A Chorus Line for SLOC's 50th Anniversary Concert. Helena has performed as Rosalind in As You Like It, Dorine in Tartuffe, Aunt Martha in Arsenic and Old Lace. and Shelly in Moonchildren with the Union College Mountebanks. She appeared as Lady Agatha in the Schenectady Civic Playhouse production of Lady Windemere's Fan. Helena has done stock at Bates Summer Theatre in Lewiston, Maine, has performed in her own show at Union College Cabaret, and done other area singing engagements. Helena choreographed Gyps and Dolfs and The Music Man for Schalmont High School. She holds a B.A. in Arts/Drama from Union College. Helena will return to New York after Godspell, where she eventually hopes for a career in cartoon voicing.

Bill is making his debut with SLOC in Godspell. Currently majoring in Theatre at SUNYA, Bill is also studying voice with Gary Aldrich. He has appeared as Joe Hardy in Dann Yankees. Don Mealy-Director/Musical Director

Don held the same position for SLOC's Charlie Brown and was Mustical Director for Amahl, Globolinks, Mame, Annie Get Your Gun, Jacques Brel, 1776, Funny Girl, and SLOC's 50th Anniversary Concert. He appeared as Barnaby in Hello Dolly and the Minstrel in Once Upon a Mattress. He studied directing at Ithaca College, Alfred University, and Albany State. He has directed over two dozen shows, his favorite production being Albee's The Sandbox. He studied conducting with Frederick Fennell and Gregg Smith, and presently studies voice with Gary Aldrich. He has previously been associated with Moravia Summer Theatre, Cornell Octagons, Kiniya Summer Theatre, Ithaca Opera Co., Albany Civic, Schenectady Civic, and Playwrites Theatre. Don is currently a member of SLOC's Board of Directors and is serving as Vice-President of Artistic Operations. He has participated in several recordings for Columbia Records including the recent Charles Ives: the 100th Anniversary. Don is Director of Music at Burnt Hills Methodist and a teacher at Shenendehowa where he is director of the Pumpernickel Players. He is a graduate of Ithaca College.

Christine Searle-Assistant Director

Chris was born and educated in England, where she worked with the Nèw Vic Theatre group both onstage in several roles, and backstage, as director, choreographer and make-up artist. Her roles include Laura in *The Glass Menagerie*, and Elvira in *Blithe Spirit*. Her directing credits include *Romanoff and Juliet*, and *Billy Liar*. Since coming to Schenectady ten years ago she has worked with several area groups. Last season she was make-up chairman for *George M*, and has worked on several other SLOC productions.
