The Story

Dorothy Bantam, daughter of Squire Bantam of Chanticleer Hall, was betrothed in her infancy to Geoffrey Wilder, nephew of the Squire, though the two have never met. Dorothy, and her cousin Lydia, are attending the annual hop-picking festival in the village, in the guise of serving maids, and sisters to Phyllis, daughter of the landlord, John Tuppitt. There they meet Wilder, and his friend, Harry Sherwood, who fall in love with the girls. Wilder is confronted by Lurcher, a sheriff's officer, with the matter of an unpaid debt. Wilder plans to obtain the money from Squire Bantam by a devious method. At Chanticleer Hall, Wilder disguised as the Duke of Berkshire, and his retinue, meet Dorothy and Lydia, whom they do not recognize as the supposed serving maids, and fall in love with them again. The scheme for obtaining the money is carried out, Dorothy and Lydia test the affections of their swains, and the plot of Wilder and Sherwood is revealed to the Squire. The involved situations are straightened out before the curtain falls.
